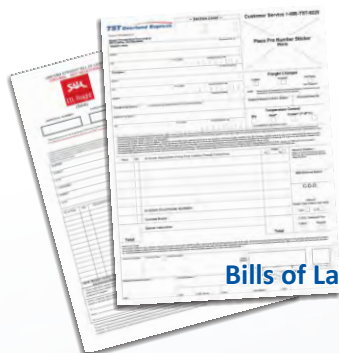
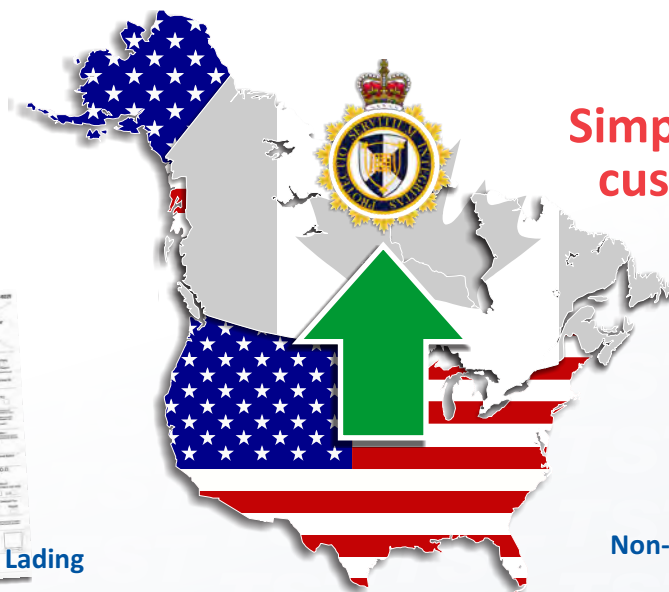


Shipping to

Bills of Lading



NAFTA Certificate of Origin (B232)
Non-NAFTA Certificate of Origin (B239)

Bill of Lading – The primary document used by a shipper to procure transportation services from commercial carriers. Please indicate the type of clearance preferred by the consignee and the name of the Customs Broker or their appointed agent(s) at the frontier port or inland surferance warehouse.

Invoice – The seller's invoice (i.e. commercial, pro forma, sales) to the importer clearly defining the type of goods, quantity, price of each type and terms of sale.

Certificate of Origin – A document certifying where the merchandise was manufactured.

A declaration for Country of Origin must be made on your documentation. It can be shown on the invoice, but for the Importer to qualify for NAFTA exemption, a NAFTA Certificate should be included.

Once completed, this documentation must be tendered to the driver at time of pick-up.

The Pre-Arrival Review System (PARS) is a service option developed by the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) that allows for documentation to be submitted for release prior to the goods arriving in Canada.

Additional documentation may be required for merchandise such as food and related products.
